

reater Accra Region, the gateway to Ghana and home of our vibrant Capital City, is one of the most exciting and distinctive regions.

Although the smallest region, it is the most densely populated, containing the two great

metropolitan areas of Accra and Tema, the Country's major industrial and commercial centres.

Spreading along the Atlanti coast, the city is well endowed with luxury as well as great value hotels, excellen restaurants and nightclubs.



A range of absorbing museums and fine public monuments, modern business and commercial areas, as well as busy markets and tree-lined residential suburbs, is ready to be explored.

The beaches of the Atlantic coast are popular with visitors and Chanaians alike. Labadi Pleasure Beach and Kokrobite Beach are particularly popular at weekends.

Further along the coast in Ada and the estuary of the great River Volta. Here the fine beaches of the estuary and the Atlantic coast provide popular resort areas.

Water sports and river trips make this a great place to relax, while the waters off the coast teem with game fish.













BLACKSTAR GATE

This monument includes the independence Arch to the South of the square backdropped by the Gulf of Guinea. The monument bears the large inscription "AD 1957" and Freedom and Justice".

JAMES TOWN LIGHTHOUSE

Take in the sights from one of the oldest structures in Accra and get a bird's-eye view of one of Accra's liveliest neighbourhoods.

ARTISTS ALLIANCE GALLERY

The best edit of clothing, accessories, art, antiques and so much more are on offer in this charming building by the sea.

NUBUKE FOUNDATION

Explore this haven for local art talent, which is a lovely spot to spend the day browsing one of their special events or numerous exhibitions.

W. E. B. DUBOIS CENTRE

Discover a hidden part of Ghana's history through this Pan-Africanist icon in this special building celebrating his life and death.

LABADI BEACH

Beach parties and reggae nights reign supreme on Accra's premier city beach.

NATIONAL MUSUEM

Discover the history of this young country through a series of exhibits at this comprehensive museum.

ICON HOUSE

Shop at trendy La Maison, have casual lunch at Coco Lounge and a smart dinner at Urban Grill, followed by drinks at Cave Bar or on the terrace, and end your night at Accra's premier nightclub, Carbon. All is possible in this landmark building overlooking Independence Avenue.

ARTS CENTRE FOR NATIONAL CULTURE

Get the full Accra experience and be prepared to haggle and be overwhelmed at this artisans' area in the centre of town.

LEGON BOTANICAL GARDEN

The garden was a science research centre for the botany class of the University of Chana, it served as a habitat for plant species such as flora and fauna species. In 2015, the garden was converted into a tourist and recreational centre.

KWAME NKRUMAH MAUSOLEUM

It is dedicated to the prominent Ghanaian leader, Dr Kwame Nkrumah who fought for the independence of the nation, Ghana. The building is meant to represent an upside-down sword, which in Akan culture is a symbol of peace. The mausoleum is surrounded by water, a symbol of life.




































he Western Region of Ghana us an integrated complex of beautiful safe beaches and African touch beach resorts.

It has the largest collection of European trading forts (later used in the slave trade); the highest tropical jungles; numerous mines, picturesque villages and friendly people; and old architectural styles and vivacious festivals.

The region's water villages on stilts are amazing to experience. A visitor can charter a local canoe out to the village and actually stay overnight in a guest house on the water.

The region has 192 Km of tropical beaches on the Atlantic Ocean and a tropical climate characterized by moderate temperatures all year round.







NZULENZU

Nzulenzu is a small village over 500 years old and situated in the middle of lake Amanzuri. It is supported entirely by stilts made of central wood with a raffia walkway. All amenities such as schools, hospitals, churches are built on the lake.

Nzulenzu is rich in love, laughter and peace. At Nzulenzu, there are nearby attractions, such as the Anaka Nature reserve, fort Apollonia and the childhood home of Dr Kwame Nkrumah.

The excursion from Beyin involves a walk through the reeds at the lake's edge, and a trip in a dugout cance to the village. The village welcomes visitors every day except Thursday, which is a sacred day.

THE CASTLES OF THE WESTERN REGION

The Western Region is another region with a rich heritage demonstrated by the number of castles still open to visitors.

The best examples in the region are:

- 1. Fort St Appolonia at Beyin
- 2. Fort cross at Dixcove (1693)
- 3. Fort Batensteyn (1656) at Butri
- 4. Fort Groot Fredericksburg at Princess Town
- 5. Fort S. Antonio at Axim (1515)
- 6. Fort Dorothea (ruins) at Akwida
- 7. Fort Sebastian at Shama

AKATEKYI CROCODILE POND

30km west of Takoradi, the local fetish priest entices the crocodiles from the water with a live chicken. Bring a bottle of schnapps for the libation. Visitors are welcome every day except Wednesday, a sacred day.

THE BEACHES OF THE WESTERN REGION

Western region is famous for some of the best beaches in Ghana. Some of the most popular beaches are:

- 1. Busua Pleasure Beach only 5km from fort metal cross
- 2. Sports Club Beach behind the Atlantic hotel in Takoradi
- 3. Ajua Beach just 200metres from Dadowa lagoon
- 4. Princess Town Beach off the Takoradi/Elubo highway
- 5. Mimia Beach a secluded beach with rocky cave perfect for picnics.



















he Eastern Region of Ghana is a rich blend of dramatic landscapes, historic relics and traditional cultures.

The ancient blends with the 20th century in this region so close to but such a contrast with Accra. The region is dominated

by Lake Volta, one of the world's largest man-made lakes, and the Akosombo Dam, source of much of Ghana's hydroelectric power. Both are worth a visit. A favourite excursion is the weekend trip to Dodi Islands. Striking landscapes are overlooked by the Krobo Mountains and the Akwapim Ridge.

The Eastern Region is famous for its large areas of lush tropical forest, and cascading waterfalls.

The Eastern Region contains Ghana's only commercial diamond mine at Akwatia, while the birthplace of our great cocoa industry can be found at Mampong-Akwapim.

The regional capital is Koforidua, a pleasant traditional town with agreeable hotels and a busy market. Traditional and historic villages and towns are part of the richness of the Eastern Region of Chana.

Many visitor's introduction to the Eastern region is the botanical gardens at Aburi, which was opened in 1890, and have always been a favourite excursion from Accra.

Also, worth a visit is the forest of Atewa-Atwirebu, with hundreds of birds and butterflies.









ABURI BOTANICAL GARDENS

These century-old botanical gardens, about one hour's drive from Accra. Accra offers a rich collection of tropical flora which attracts scores of birds and butterflies. The tranquil paths are a popular excursion for our city dwellers.

TETTEH QUARSHIE'S COCOA FARM

The first cocoa farm established in the country from seed first brought from Fernando Po Island. From this small beginning grew our major cocoa industry.

LAKE VOLTA

One of the largest man-made lakes in the world, the lake and the Akosombo dam are two of Ghana's great achievements. The lake offers opportunities for cruising, especially to the Dodi islands.

SLAVE MARKET OF ABONSE

Traces of the 17th and 18th century slave market can still be seen in a town that was an important crossroads on the slave route.



BOTIFALLS

Spectacular, but seasonal waterfall in the forest reserve at Huhunya. In the immediate vicinity are cascades, at their best in June to August.


THE WATERFALLS OF BEGORO

Boti Falls where both male and female falls cascade midstream to produce one of the purest, whitest and elegant streams of water the world has ever witnessed. Just the place for picnics.

UMBRELLA ROCK

The natural rock which has been affectionately dubbed "The Umbrella Rocks" looks exactly like an open umbrella and has been in existence since the beginning of time. Atop the umbrella showcases a mixture of massive green forest.


















he Volta Region is an area of extraordinary scenic beauty

The rolling hills and valleys, rocky outcrops overlooking Lake Volta, and lagoons, rivers and waterfall make for one of nature's most attractive gift to Ghana.

From the coastal plain, fringed by sun-dappled beaches and mangrove swamps, through moist deciduous rain forests in the central belt, where Mt. Afadjato at 885m is the highest point in Ghana, to the arid savannah of northern Ghana, you can experience almost every tropical climate in West Africa

The festivals and ceremonies reflect the rich diversity of history and culture of tribal life in the region.


The relics of European coastal forts and other structures still remain, while further north vestiges of the German colonial era are unmistakable.

The regional museum at Ho is an ideal place to understand the background to our heritage. Hohoe is an important centre of herbal medicine, which is of significant and growing importance both in Chana and the western world today.

Discover the Wli Waterfalls in the tropical forest near Hohoe, the highest in Chana, or the nearby Tsatsadu Falls at Alavanyo, or the Tagbo Falls at LiateWote which are almost as spectacular.

Afadjato Mountain attracts climbers of all ages, while the Kalakpa Game Production Reserve is a special place for environmentalists.

The beaches of the Volta estuary are amongst the best in Chana. Swimming is popular in some areas, although the sea is generally rough along the Atlantic coast. New hotels are providing facilities for waters ports and deep-sea fishing.











LAKE VOLTA ESTUARY

The estuary is an area of great scenic beauty with river and ocean beaches, and picnic spots shaded by palm tree. The sand bars are the nesting grounds for sea birds, and endangered species of twitter are still found here.

THE KETA-ANGAW LAGOON **BASIN**

Important wetland and breeding ground for migratory birds.

TAFI MONKEY VILLAGE

The sacred monkey sanctuaries around TafiAtome, some 5km away from the Avatime hills.

THE WATERFALLS OF THE VOLTA **REGION**

Although some may be seasonal, all are set in attractive wooded or mountain settings

- 1. Wli falls 20km from Hohoe, in the Wli nature reserve
- 2 Tagbo falls LiateWote
- 3. Tsatsodu falls 10km from Hohoe
- 4. Aflambo falls -Leklebi
- 5. Amedzofe Abadzeme falls



WLI WATERFALLS

Wli Waterfalls, also called Agumatsa Falls, is a popular and dramatic tourist site near the village of Wli not far from the Togo border

Most tourists make the easy walk to the lower falls, which is mostly a flat trail but stunning and beautiful in setting, made even more dramatic by the presence of thousands of fruit bats nesting high up on the nearby cliffs.

There are inviting pools at the base of both falls where the hearty can take a chilly dip. The Wli waterfalls is the highest water fall in West Africa

The walk takes you through the Agumatsa Wildlife Sanctuary.



MOUNTAIN AFDJATO

With 885m Mount Afadiato is the highest peak in Ghana. From the top of the mountain there are magnificent panoramic views of surrounding communities, forests, mountains, deep valleys, and, in distance. Lake Volta.

Behind Mount Afadiato is Aduadu. the highest point in Ghana, Mount Afadiato area is well-known for biodiversity richness. Researchers have recorded over 300 species of butterflies and 33 species of mammals

Mona and Spot-nosed monkeys are regular sights. Furthermore, Birdlife International has selected the site as one of the key Important Bird Areas in Ghana.

KALAKPE GAME PRODUCTION RESERVE

At Abutia, 15km from Ho, the reserve has increasing species of migratory and indigenous birds' life, buck, buffalo and monkeys.


KYABOBO NATIONAL PARK

A newly designated National Park in the foothill of Mt. Dibobo, on the border with Togo.


GROTTOS AND CAVES

In the limestone hills, the grottos and caves are dramatic. Not to be missed are:

- 1. The ancestral caves of Likpe -14km form Hohoe
- 2. The grottos of Kpando -Aghehoe and Aziavi
- 3. The caves of Nyaqbo and Loqba
- 4. Caves and iron mine workings -Alepafu.




















he Central Region is the former government centre of the Gold Coast. Cape Coast was the seat of the British colonial administration up until 1877.

The coastline is famous for its ancient forts and castles built by early European traders, and

three of them at Elmina, St. Jago and Cape Coast have been identified as World Heritage Monuments by the World heritage Foundation under UNESCO.

The Region is also famous for its palm-fringed beaches, fascinating fishing villages and

historic towns, and rich natural attractions. Kakum National Park, just 30km north of Cape Coast, is the foremost nature reserve in Southern Ghana and well worth a visit.

Almost untouched virgin rainforest has been preserved as a habitat for birds, butterflies and rare local animals, and Kakum is most accessible, as it is very easy to reach from Accra.

The Region's culture is depicted through its many exciting festivals which are held throughout the year.

The historic towns in the region that deserve a visit include Winneba, traditionally known as 'S i m p a 'W i n n e b a; KromantsejAbanze, the site of Fort Amsterdam; Duakwa and Mensa Krom, home of some of the Region's best woodcarvers; Ajumako aware where the carvers specialise in royal regalia, stools, linguistic staffs and clan totems.

Throughout the Central Region there are welcoming hotels and restaurants, all an easy drive from Accra.

If you are seeking to discover the historical links between Africa and the Americas and Europe, or just wanting to explore a culture that has its roots in another era, or just wanting to relax on a sundappled beach, then the Central Region must not be missed.











CASTLES

The castles along the coast of the Central Region are amongst the best preserved in Chana. Not to be missed are Cape Coast Castle, Elmina Castle and Fort St Jago. Local highlights include:

- 1. Castle tours, including the slave dungeons
- 2. Walking tours of Elmina
- 3. The 19th Century Dutch Cemetery
- 4. The Fishermen's Market
- 5. The Cape Coast Castle Museum

Excellent Walking tours (and a canopy walkway) through the forest provide the opportunity to see much of Ghana's indigenous plant life, as well as rare butterflies, birds and game (that could include the extraordinary Bongo and forest elephant). Highlights include:

- 1. Forest Walks
- 2. Treetop Canopy Walkway
- 3. Bird Watching
- 4. Medicinal Plants

THE BEACHES OF THE CENTRAL REGION

Beaches lovers will enjoy our palm-fringed beaches, warmed by African sunshine, where surf ranges from gentle rollers to sizeable breakers. Popular spots are:

TRADITIONAL FISHING VILLAGES

Along the coast of the Central Region are a succession of busy fishing villages and traditional market town that reflect the distinct cultures of the district.

Visitors to all the village will be welcomed with traditional Chanaian hospitality. Of particular interest are:

- Winneba famous for its fishing fleet, masquerade festival and local ceramics
- 2. Mankessim well known for its Posuban Shrine and busy market
- 3. Kromantse/Abandze twin fishing villages, one of the important trading centres to which the late Louis Armstrong, the great jazz player, traced his ancestry.


They all make great souvenirs of your visit to the central region. Particularly important village are:

Winneba – famous for its beautiful and unusual ceramics
Gomoa-Otsew-Jukwa – a village of pottery makers













he Ashanti Region is the cultural heartbeat of Ghana. Land of the Golden Stool expressed in the language, passage rites, festivals, cuisine and ordinary day-to-day activities.

The scenic and hilly capital city of Kumasi is a vast tropical

rainforest belt. Still forest dominated by impressive buttress rooted forest giants, alongside large cocoa farms and picturesque hillside settlements

Beautiful weather; chilly in the mornings, bright, clear and sunny in the afternoons for

most of the year and cool nights provide ideal conditions for visitors to experience this exciting colourful world of hearty hardworking people.

Ashanti is also home of the most important gold mine in Chana at Obuasi (50km southwest of Kumasi). Surface visits can be arranged, and the town still has air of the gold rush days of the 1890s.

A variety of options from open-air drinking bars, street side cafes, casinos, to night clubs and theatres are available.

To discover the traditional heartland of Ghana, a visit to Ashanti is a must.

Kumasi is the capital of the Asante kingdom and the local highlights are:

- Manhyia Palace Museum
- Centre for National Culture
- The Prempeh II Jubilee Museum
- Kumasi Fort & Military Museum
- OkomfoAnokye Sword
- Kejetia Market
- Kumasi Zoo
- Traditional Street sculptures

















KOMFO ANOKYE SWORD

The 'unmovable' Sword of the Komfo Anokye remains in the grounds of the Okomfo Anokye Teaching Hospital, where he pushed it. It is believed the Okomfo pronounced that no one would be able to remove the sword, and so it has remained in spite of many attempts.

THE CRAFTS OF ASHANTI

The crafts villages surrounding Kumasi include: Bonwire – (18km NE of Kumasi) Kente weaving Pankrono- (3km N of Kumasi) Pottery Ahwiaa (6km N of Kumasi) Wood carvings Ntonso – Adinkra cloth making Asuofia/Asamang (Barakese Road) bead making Ampabame Krofrom (10km from Ahodwo) Brass smithing, Coldsmiths and Silversmiths can be seen in Kumasi

PATAKRO SHRINE

Pankrono is located 8 km on Mampong Road. Renowned for its distinctive and colourful pottery created through transitional process without the use of the potter's wheel.

BOBIRI FOREST BUTTERFLY SANCTUARY

Located 20km on the Kumasi – Accra highway, a quiet research centre for the Forestry Research Institute showcasing an arboretum, forest hiking trails and a butterfly sanctuary. Lodging, guiding and interpretative materials are available

BOMFOBIRI WILDLIFE

SANCTUARY:

About 80km northeast of Kumasi. The reserve showcases a rare tropical landscape, vibrant waterfall and a wide variety of bird and animal life.

DIGYA NATIONAL PARK

Occupying 3.478 square kilometres of undulating terrain on the western shore of the Volta Lake. Made up of predominately Guinea Savannah Woodland and gallery forest along the major rivers, complete with sandstone inselbergs.

Has at least six primate species, black and white colobus monkeys and baboons, elephants and a variety of antelope species, crocodiles, buffalos, water bucks, hartebeests, warthogs, Manatee and clawless otters and are also reported to be present.

KOGYAE STRICT NATURE RESERVE

This nature reserve protects about five species of monkey.

OWABI FOREST RESERVE AND BIRD SANCTUARY

Formerly, Kumasi's only source of drinking water was the Owabi River, located to the west of the city.

When the river was dammed to create a reservoir, the resulting watershed extended deep into the city's nearby forests.

The reservoir and forest have since become the natural habitat for

many species of the region's wildlife, as well as for a number of migratory birds.

LAKE BOSOMTWI

It is located 31km southeast of Kumasi. A picturesque meteorite Crater Lake surrounded by dozens of virgin fishing and farming villages.

The Lake Basin is ideal for mountaineering, diving, swimming and relaxation. Accessible by road from Kumasi

THE PREMPEH II JUBILEE MUSEUM

Located in the Centre for National Culture ground, the museum houses a fascinating collection of Ashanti History such as memorabilia of Okomfo Anokye, including the 300 years old antique treasure bag which he forbade anyone to open.

MANHYIA PALACE AND MUSEUM

This is the official residence of the Asantehene. Its large courtyard and museum hold statues of past great kings and queens of the Asante Kinadom.

GHANA ARMED FORCES MUSEUM

This Museum exhibits materials that primarily concern the British-Ashanti war of 1900, World War II and Ghana's recent military history. On display are maps, old photographs, and military regalia.



















he Northern Region, one of the ten administrative regions of Ghana, a country lying on 0 longitude of the West Africa Coast.

Ghanaian hospitality is legendary, the Northern Region is no exception. And so, you are welcome to enjoy the scenic natural features, exotic culture and the legacies of a history of the largest region in Ghana.



















MOLE NATIONAL PARK

Mole National Park is Ghana's largest wildlife park and is located in northern Ghana It is home to 93 mammalian species, 33 reptiles nine amphibians and an estimated 300 birds' species.

The mammals include some 600 elephants, 2,000 roam antelopes, 3,000 hartebeests, 4,000 waterbucks, 5,000 buffalo and some 6,000 warthogs. Uncounted lions, leopards, hyenas and various primates can also be seen in Mole.

very lucky. Leopard.

You can opt for a walking safari or a traditional game drive accompanied by an armed guard. The best time to spot wildlife is during the dry season from January to March as animals congregate around the water sources.

LARABANGA MOSOUE

A 13th century mosque, believed to be first built by Moorish traders. it is one of the holiest sites in Chana. Its distinctive facade has been widely photographed.

LARABANGA MYSTERY STONE

Nearby is a mysterious boulder that is the subject of a splendid local legend.

to protect Naleriqu (120km from 'Bolga') from raiders, this has now been recognized as part of the slave route.

SALAGA

The slave route is recognized at Salaga, where the Trans-Sahara caravans paused in Salaga market. Leg pegs can still be seen in the marketplace.

YENDI

96km East of Tamale, Yendi was part of a 19th century German settlement. Many of the Germans who died in battle with the Dagomba people are buried in the cemetery. The grave of the slave raider Batafu is said to be near here
